Thomas J. Pulaski is a 24 year member of the Prince William County, Virginia, Police Department. He served as a police officer initially and then rapidly rose through the civilian ranks and is now a member of the Department's senior command staff serving as the Senior Administrative Manager. He started his 28 year career in law enforcement working at FBI Headquarters in Washington, D.C. as a program analyst.

Mr. Pulaski has been involved in the development of several noteworthy projects during his career including PERF's report, *Implementing an Agency-level Performance Measurement System: A Guide for Law Enforcement Executives*; a PERF/DOJ-COPS Office publication, *Advancing Community Policing Through Community Governance*; and the International City/County Management Association's (ICMA) *Comparative Performance Measurement Consortium* to assess the quality of local government services. In addition, he has extensive experience in designing and constructing police facilities and implementing major information technology systems. Currently, he is the project manager overseeing an unprecedented two-year study being conducted by a team of researchers evaluating the Department's Illegal Immigration Enforcement Policy.

Mr. Pulaski is a Past President of the International Association of Law Enforcement Planners (IALEP) and a former Chairman of the Washington Metropolitan Council of Governments Police Planners Subcommittee. He is a member of the Police Executive Research Forum and the International Association of Chiefs of Police.
